From the Principal

Crossing at Hawkesbury Road

I have noticed an increasing number of parents and carers crossing Hawkesbury Road away from the pedestrian crossing at the traffic lights. The council have provided fencing to prevent pedestrians crossing Hawkesbury Road right up to the driveway of the school but cannot provide fencing beyond the driveway as cars need to access the school. Crossing at this place is particularly dangerous and sets a bad example for our students.

Please cross at a safe location such as at the lights at the corner of Priddle Street or further down near the shopping centre.



School Beautification

Recently we opened the extension to the kindergarten playground. I would like to thank Julie Owens and the Federal Government for the grant of \$20,000 from the Local Schools Community Fund to assist with the construction of this much needed space. Kindergarten 2021 thoroughly enjoy their extended playground.





Last week our K-2 amphitheatre construction was completed. This area has now been landscaped and our students are beginning to enjoy this area. It is intended for passive play and as an outdoor classroom.





Work has commenced on the construction of a deck and shade shelter in the year 5/6 section of the school that our year five and six students will be able to enjoy in a few weeks. Once construction has been completed seating will be installed and the surrounding area will be landscaped incorporating gardens and additional seating.

NAPLAN Online 2021

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.



Our school will be participating in NAPLAN Online between **11 and 14 May 2021**.

In preparation for NAPLAN Online, our school will also be participating in practice tests between 22 March and 1 April. The practice test is a trial-run and key preparation activity for NAPLAN Online in May. It is not an assessment of student ability and the tests will not be marked.

Excessive preparation for NAPLAN Online is not recommended. Students can use the <u>public demonstration site</u> (<u>https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site</u>) to familiarise themselves with the types of questions and tools available in the NAPLAN Online tests.

Selective High School Placement Test 2021 for entry to Year 7 in 2022

Test information for parents and students

When will the test be held?

The test will be held on **Thursday 11 March 2021 at 9.00am** at the allocated test centre. Signs will show you which entrance to use.

How long does the test take?

Parents must drop students off at the entrance to the test centre by **9.00am** and return promptly at **1.30pm** to pick them up.

There is a short rest break after the first test, a longer break after the second test when students can eat the food they bring, and a short rest break after the third test.

The finish time may vary according to the size of the test centre and its facilities. There is no supervision for students before 8:30am. If the test finishes early, students will be supervised. Please do not be late to collect your child after the test.

Dropping off and collecting your child

Test day is a regular school day for the test school so it is important to avoid disruption to staff and students at the school.

Do not park in or near the school grounds and observe any instructions from the school about parking restrictions. Signs will direct you to the entrance to use.

As parents will not be allowed on school grounds you will need to take your child to the designated entrance and a supervisor will meet students there. Please give anaphylaxis kits or other approved equipment to that supervisor. Collect your child from the same entrance after the test. The only exception is where a parent has prior written authority to attend for medical reasons.

If you arrange for your child to be collected by someone else or to walk to school or home, you must send a note with your child giving permission and accepting responsibility for your child's safety.

What if something goes wrong?

If something occurs to prevent your child attending the test or doing his or her best in the test, you can submit a request for consideration of illness or misadventure by 18 March 2021. You will need to get a medical certificate and independent evidence of illness covering the day if the problem is medical, or other relevant evidence if it is not about illness or injury.

If your child arrives late there will be no extra time given.

Hygiene precautions

Wearing of masks and using hand sanitiser is permitted if you wish your child to do so. The presiding officer and supervisors will be observing hygiene requirements in place for NSW schools.

Please do not bring your child to the test if he or she is ill with respiratory disease. Presiding officers may not admit a student if they consider others in the test centre to be at risk from contagious disease.

What should students wear to the test?

Students should wear school uniform, including a jumper and a hat for the break.

What to bring to the test

Students must bring a printed copy of their 'Test authority letter' that shows their application number.

Students may bring a wristwatch that does **not** make a noise or calculate, communicate or photograph.

Tips for students

The test is designed to show your ability so there is no particular material to study before the test. You'll use your knowledge and skills to answer challenging questions.

Sample tests

You can see the types of questions that may be asked, and the explanation of answers, in the sample tests at <u>https://education.nsw.gov.au/public-schools/selective-high-schools-and-opportunity-classes/year-</u><u>7/the-test</u>. Practise answering the questions using the sample answer sheet.

On test day

- Go to the toilet before you leave home.
- You will be met at the school entrance by a supervisor who will show you where to go to line up with your school group.
- Pay attention and follow all instructions from the presiding officer and supervisors at all times.
- Put your hand up if you have a problem or a question or if you need to go to the toilet.
- Don't talk to other students once you enter the test room.
- In the test room you will sit at the desk which has a sheet showing your name and other personal details.
- There will be a short rest break after the first and third tests and a longer break after the second test, when you will go outside and eat food you have brought.

The tests

There are four tests. They will be done in this order:

Mathematical reasoning	40 minutes	35 multiple choice questions	
Thinking skills	40 minutes	40 multiple choice questions	
Writing	30 minutes	1 question	

During the test

Listen carefully to instructions.

Put your hand up if you have any problems or any questions at any time.

You will be asked to copy your name and application number onto all of your test papers.

Answer sheets

Read each test question carefully before you start answering it. Think about what it asks you to do. Choose the answer that you think is best.

Make sure you show your answers on the answer sheet. Answers recorded in the question booklet cannot be marked. Answer in the question booklet only if you have been given permission to do so and if so, you will have separate instructions.

Marks are not taken off for wrong answers. Incorrect, double or blank answers score zero. It is better to have a guess rather than leave an answer blank as this helps you make sure you are answering on the correct line.

If you want to work anything out in the multiple-choice tests you can write on the question booklet or on the back of the sheet with your personal details on it. For the writing test there is a page for planning in the question booklet that you can use if you wish. Any notes that you have made in the question booklet or on the writing planning page or personal details sheet will not be marked.

In the writing test you must write only about the question you are given. The question will ask you to write for a particular purpose and audience. Markers will pay attention to creative ideas, the structure of the writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation as well as effectiveness for the purpose and audience.

Timing

Use your time wisely. Work steadily. If you find a question too difficult, do not spend a long time on it. Shade in the answer you think is best and come back to that question later if you have time.

There will be no time warnings during the test. You will need to check the test centre's official clock to find out how much time you have left. Put your hand up if you cannot see it clearly.

Test conditions

If suspected of cheating you risk having the test marks not counted. Please make sure you:

- do not open the question booklet until the presiding officer tells you to do so
- do not look at the work of others during the test
- do not talk to other students while in the test room
- do not keep writing after you are told to stop.

Good advice

Get a good night's sleep the night before the test and try to keep calm. It's normal to feel nervous about a test. If you can relax, you will have a better chance to think clearly and do your best.

COVID

School gates will not open until 2.45pm each afternoon and parents are reminded to actively socially distance when on school grounds. Students in Kindergarten, Year 2, Year 4 and Year 6 finish school at 2:50pm and students in Years 1,3 and 5 finish school at 3 pm. To support our physical distancing we request that all parents leave the school grounds as soon as they have collected their child.

COVID No Playtime After School

Unfortunately parents and students cannot remain on the school grounds in the afternoon. COVID restrictions mean that parents need to leave the school site as soon as they have collected their children. If you wish to catch up with friend this now has to occur off the school site.

Collecting Your Child From Sick Bay or Early Leaver

Your child's safety and wellbeing is important. Parents and carers are requested to present photo identification when collecting your child from sick bay or during the school day to leave early for an appointment.

If you need to arrange a relative or friend to collect your child, you are expected to provide the school with the person's **full name and phone number**. Your relative of friend must provide photo identification to school staff.

If your child needs to leave school early, where practical, please collect your child outside of the recess and lunch breaks. On arrival at the school, please report to the school office and our friendly office staff will then arrange for your child to meet you.

Packing a Healthy Lunchbox

Advice from the Healthy Kids Association

With the unpredictable nature of our day to day lives, preparing and packing a healthy lunchbox can be a difficult task. Finding time to shop and prepare interesting and healthy meals for school lunches can stressful. But the foods we send to school with our kids can contribute up to 1/3 of their daily intake of nutrients. So it's important to pack a balanced lunch to ensure they're getting the nutrients they need.

Keep "occasional" foods such as snack food bars, sweet biscuits, flavoured or coated popcorn and savoury biscuits and chips out of the lunch box. Although they can offer a practical convenient solution for lunchboxes, they should not replace the core snack and should be kept for special occasions.

Avoid including the ones with added **<u>confectionery</u>** and opt for wholegrain varieties packed full of whole foods you can see with your eyes.



When packing a lunchbox for your child, you should feel confident that you're providing them with a nutritious supply of food that will get them through the day with the energy they need to function.

Follow this rule to make packing a healthy lunchbox easy: PACK THE CORE 4 (plus 1 for active and fast growing kids).

What are the CORE 4?

Main

lunch

- Main lunch item a sandwich, roll, wrap or salad based on grains such as pasta, rice or quinoa.
- Nutritious snack choose a snack from the five food groups such as a cold chicken drumstick, crackers with cheese, veggie sticks and hommus, or yoghurt.
 - Piece of fresh fruit whatever is in season.

Drink – always include a water bottle. Add an additional small reduced fat milk drink (less than 300ml) or a 99% fruit juice drink (less than 200ml) once or twice a week.

PLUS 1 additional snack

Every child is different and depending on their activity level or rate of growth, they may need an additional snack in their lunchbox. If this is the case, we recommend choosing a fifth item from the five food groups first, such as those listed in lunchbox item number 2 (the nutritious snack). This will provide the extra nutrients some kids need.

Occasionally...

always include water

For variety and enjoyment it's OK to include an occasional "extra" item in place of this fifth snack option. Extra foods include sweet biscuits, muesli bars, packets of chips, confectionary or dry noodle products. These kinds of items should not make a daily appearance in the lunchbox, but can be added once a week for variety and enjoyment and to teach balance.

If Your Child Is Unwell

Keep them at Home

until all symptoms are gone

If your child has a fever, cough, cold or runny nose; headache, sore throat, shortness of breath, loss of taste or smell then

They need to be tested for Covid.

Keep your child at home until they receive **a negative test result and all symptoms are gone**.

Schools must sight the negative COVID-19 test before your child returns to class. Email the screenshot of your child's negative test result to the school with your child's first name, last name and class in the subject line.

Students who have seasonal allergic rhinitis or other flu-like symptoms are still required to have a Covid test.

If your child has vomited or had diarrhoea, they are required to stay at home for at 24-48 hours.

Keep Your Child At Home until symptoms are gone.

School Policy: Allergies and Anaphylaxis

We have a number of students at Westmead Public School who are allergic to nuts.

For these students, contact with nuts can result in a life-threatening anaphylactic reaction.

We encourage parents not to send any nuts or nut products to school with their children.

Students should not share food. Remind your child about the importance of washing their hands and eating their own food.





ANAPHYLAXIS

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sometimes sudden allergic reaction. It can occur when a susceptible person is exposed to an allergen (such as a food or an insect sting). Reactions usually begin within minutes of exposure and can progress rapidly over a period of up to two hours or more. Anaphylaxis is potentially life threatening and always requires an emergency response.

It is the responsibility of the parent to notify the school that their child has an allergy and is at risk of anaphylaxis. This notification should occur either at the time of enrolment, or if the student is already enrolled, as soon after diagnosis as possible.

As with other serious health conditions, schools put in place strategies to manage a student at risk of anaphylaxis at school or while the student is engaged in school related activities.

To support students with food allergies we:-

- Request that all parents clearly label lunch boxes, bottles and other drinks with their child's name
- Remind your child about the importance of washing their hands, eating their own food, and not sharing food, food utensils or food containers.

Please contact your child's class teacher before sending food birthday treats to school.

Your Childs Health

A REMINDER TO PARENTS TO NOTIFY THE SCHOOL ABOUT YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH

Parents and Caregivers have an obligation to inform the school about their child's health, even if they are not requesting specific support from our school. Our school asks for medical information when you enrol your child. It is also important that you let us know if your child's health care needs change or if a new health condition develops.

Information about allergies, medical conditions such as asthma and diabetes and other health care related issues (including prior conditions such as medical procedures in the last 12 months) should be provided to the school by parents. Please contact the school office staff who will assist. Please also remember to notify staff in the school office of any changes to your contact details or to the contact details of other people nominated as emergency contacts.

Information you provide to the school will be stored securely and will only be used or disclosed in order to support your son or daughter's health needs or as otherwise required by law.

Does your child need to have medication at school?

Before medication can be given to your child at school, you need to follow these important steps. Please contact the school if you have any questions.

Administering prescribed medication at school

When a medical practitioner has prescribed medication that must be administered during the school day, parents are responsible for:

- bringing this need to the attention of the school
- ensuring that the information is updated if it changes
- supplying the medication and any 'consumables' necessary for its administration in a timely way
- collaborating with the school in working out arrangements for the supply and administration of the prescribed medication.

Administering Medication at School continued

The administration of such medication forms part the Department's common law duty of care to take reasonable steps to keep students safe while they attend school. This duty of care is fulfilled through its staff members.

The administration of prescribed medication in schools is carried out by staff who volunteer and who are trained. Key points to remember:

- Parents of children who require prescribed medication to be administered at school must complete a written request. The form may be obtained from the school office or downloaded from the Department of Education website which appears at the end of this article. If parents have difficulty in completing the form they should ask the principal for assistance.
- Students must not carry medications unless there is a written agreement between the school and the student's parents that this is a planned part of the student's health care support.

Please note: Students' immediate access to prescribed medication is very important for the effective management of conditions such as asthma. Students and parents need to be advised of this requirement so that students are not left without access to critical medication. It is the principal's responsibility to fully inform relevant staff of the management implications of students requiring the administration of prescribed medication.

Except in an emergency, only individual staff members who have volunteered and been trained, will administer prescribed medication to students.

The principal will oversight implementation of the course of action that he or she has determined is necessary for the support of the student's health needs.

It is the Principal's responsibility to ensure that all copies of the written medical advice and any other relevant documentation are stored in a secure and confidential manner.

Advice or further information to assist the principal can be obtained from student welfare consultants and disability programs consultants.

Self administration of Prescribed medication by students

The common law duty of care does not extend to administering prescribed medication to students who are reasonably able to self administer.

However, if a student self administers prescribed medication the Department has a duty to take reasonable steps to ensure that the self administration is carried out safely.

Note re emergency care

Schools do not generally supply or administer medications in an emergency unless they have been provided by parents as part of the negotiated individual health care plan for a specific student.

In an emergency which has not been anticipated in the emergency/response care section of an individual health care plan, staff will provide a general emergency response, eg call an ambulance.

Where an emergency response requires the immediate administration of medication to prevent serious illness or injury, staff should administer the medication eg Ventolin for a first asthma attack.

Non-prescribed medications

In general, schools do not administer medication which has not been specifically requested by a medical practitioner for an individual student for a specific condition. In some cases the medical practitioner may not write 'a prescription' for such medication because it may be available 'over the counter'. NSW Health advises that this does not mean that the medication is not potentially harmful and that schools should follow the same procedures for such medications as for 'prescribed medications'.

WPS Library is already has opened its doors and is ready for a fun filled year ahead. Mrs Kougellis (Mon - Thurs) and Mrs Azar (Mon - Fri), will be working with our students in the library this year. Our aim is to promote reading, develop skills in ICT, information and research, digital citizenship, cyber-safety and of course help build a community of happy readers. The fantastic teaching and learning continues in our well-resources K-2 Library and 3-6 Library, which relocated last year to A Block (across from the office building).

Below are some key school library events to remember:

- NSW Premier's Reading Challenge registration opens March 1 and closes August 20
- National Simultaneous Storytime: Wednesday 19 May
- Annual Book Fair: in Term 3 (date to be announced later)
- Children's Book Week: August 21 August 27
- Borrowing for ALL students in starts: from Week 6 (March 1)

All students in Years K-6 will participate in a one hour library lesson every fortnight. During this time students are able to borrow and return books as well as participate in a library lesson. In order for students to borrow they will need to bring a library bag (preferably waterproof) and return any borrowed books. If a book is lost or damaged please let the library staff know as soon as possible.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, until further notice, the students will be borrowing only 1 book per library visit in class. This will allow safer and manageable quarantining of books upon their return. We are hopeful that as Covid 19 restrictions ease, we can restore previous borrowing limits.



K-2 Junior Library

At Westmead Public School, we are fortunate to have a specialised library for the juniors. This is a great learning space that has been designed to specifically cater for our younger readers. The K-2 Junior Library offers a wide selection of books for all levels of reading skills and interest in picture books, non-fiction, chapter books, as well as a growing collection of popular books in series. Students in Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 visit this library fortnightly for a lesson and borrowing/returning books.



Overdue Books

For the first time in many years, we can celebrate our new record of **0 overdue library books** from **2020**! Once a term, we send home overdue notes and would love your help ensuring any overdue books are returned so others can borrow them. If they have been lost or damaged please let your child's <u>library</u> teacher know. Whilst borrowing books occurs on your child's library day, returning books can be done on any day. If your child is leaving the school, the books can be returned to the library or left at the front office.



Students in years 3-6 are able to visit the 3-6 Library at lunch time. Student numbers are capped at 60 to avoid crowding. Due to Covid restrictions, borrowing at lunchtime is suspended until further notice.

Ethics classes at Westmead Public School

Could you be an ethics teacher for Westmead Public School?

We are seeking volunteers for stage 1 (K-2) so that we can provide ethics classes for all the families who have requested it for their children.

Ethics teachers receive full training by Primary Ethics, the not-for-profit organization approved to design curriculum and training for the ethics program. Training consists of a two-day workshop and short online modules. Lesson materials are provided. Suitable volunteers have an interest in children's education and development of critical thinking skills and must be available on Thursdays between 11:30 to 12:00 each week.

In ethics classes, children learn how to think logically, disagree respectfully, and support their arguments with evidence, rather than act according to blind habit or peer pressure.

Children discuss topic such as:

-imagining how others feel

-how do we treat living things?

-what is laziness?

-how do we disagree in a respectful way?

-fairness
